

HUMAN GEOGRAPHY

Time Allowed – 1.5 hours

Instructions to candidates: 2 questions should be attempted.

1. How might geographers use film and music to explore our relationship with place?
2. How are smart technologies (e.g. smartphones, wearable technologies, biometrics etc.) changing what it means to be a citizen?
3. In what ways have global governance initiatives (e.g. the United Nations, World Trade Organization) promoted stability and growth, but also maintained global inequality?
4. In what ways have Transnational Corporations (TNCs) brought about positive and negative impacts for communities around the world?
5. “We are all becoming citizens of the world”. How might human geographers challenge this statement?
6. Discuss the key reasons why you would choose interviews or a questionnaire to explore attitudes towards recycling in your local community?
7. Why are geographers ideally placed to study shifting attitudes towards international air travel and climate change?
8. “Globalization is shaping the city more than the countryside”. Do you agree with this statement?
9. Do maps provide an ‘objective’ view of the world, or are they always influenced by politics and the people that create them?
10. Identify ways in which human geographers can contribute to understanding the key issues of the twenty-first century. Discuss with reference to examples.
